Benefits to people

- Places that are good for pollinators are good for people too
- Natural green spaces and contact with wildlife is essential for our wellbeing
- The buzz of bees creates a sense of place and is a sound of our summer

Reducing and reversing the decline in pollinators in Wales through:

- Providing more diverse, flower rich habitats
- Maintaining healthy, sustainable populations of pollinators
- Raising awareness and providing information
- Encouraging positive action by everyone
- Building an evidence base to inform future actions.

Economic benefits

- 85% of the UK's apple crop and 45% of the strawberry crop relies on bees to grow
- Bees contribute £651 million to the UK economy a year

- Globally, pollination by insects has an economic value of approximately £120 billion

Environmental benefits

- In Wales, around 1,500 insect species are pollinators, including the Large Mason Bee which is now only recorded in two locations in North Wales
- In the UK, there are 24 species of bumblebee, but only eight are commonly found in most places
- Global warming is rapidly shrinking the area
 where bumblebees are found
